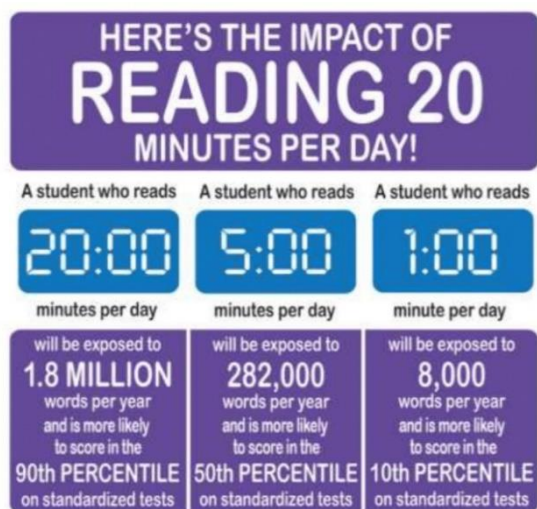
Welcome to the first St Paul's Reading Newsletter. This will be a half termly newsletter to celebrate and share all that is happening to foster our children's development as life long readers.
